WHAT IS NICE?

NICE is a codified rating system designed to accommodate and support the neurodiverse community & their participation in the theatrical experience.

NICE revolutionizes sensory friendly entertainment by shifting focus from individual show adjustments to sustainable seasonal support. We believe neurodivergent folx should be able to experience the show as intended, without compromising the artistic experience for any audience member.

NICE is sustainable. Creating seasonal accreditation allows neurodivergent individuals the opportunity to experience all shows in a season.

WHO BENEFITS?

Neurodivergence is not a niche condition. Currently, 20% of your audience experiences a form of neurodivergence, and by 2050 it is estimated that 50% of our population will benefit from accommodations such as NICE.
